#### Dear First Church Family:

Lent has always been one of my favorite times of the church year. In my youth I looked forward to the mid-week services. They provided a respite in the midst of anxious times; an anchor in the swirling storm of teenage life. Those services became times to reflect, to pray, to hear a message of hope, and to be reminded of Christ's love for me and all of creation. I remember the services being well attended, perhaps because so many could just walk to church, a benefit of living in the surrounding neighborhood. And none of us were as busy as people are now; many actually had evenings free.

But times have changed. Over the course of the past few years our own mid-week Holden Evening Prayer services - while meaningful and well-loved - have experienced a severe drop in attendance. There are a variety of reasons for that, all worthy of serious thought and reflection (just not in this space). This year we are changing our approach and offering several alternatives to mid-week worship, hoping that folks will respond and rediscover the value of the Lenten season. I invite you to weave any or all the following opportunities into your spiritual disciplines:

- Two Ash Wednesday services on March 6, 11:00 a.m. and 7:30 p.m.
- A Facebook Lent photo challenge.
- A special service project with New Covenant (specific event and date to be announced soon).
- A Lenten supper followed by a Holden Evening Prayer Service on March 26 at 7:15 PM
- An organ recital featuring our own David Gooding and Amethyst string quartet on March 31 at 4:30 p.m.
- Grammy Award winning Apollo's Fire performance of Bach's B-Minor Mass at Baldwin Wallace on April 12. A limited number of tickets will be available.
- A new adult class on Sunday mornings focused on the events of Holy Week.
- A seder meal associated with the Maundy Thursday service on April 18.
- Traditional Good Friday service on April 19.

We have made the sad discovery that more and more people are separating themselves from Lenten observances. Work and personal schedules have become overwhelming. Seasonal observances were never part of one's experience. It's hard for some to see the value. But perhaps now is the time to seriously examine our spiritual lives. We live in an unpredictable world where violence and injustice, rampant consumerism and over-commitment, accompanied by a deemphasis on religion in both personal life and the public square have become unwelcome threads in the fabric of modern society.

And so maybe now, more than ever, we need to re-establish our relationship with Jesus Christ and reconnect ourselves to the gifts of mercy and grace that come through his suffering, death, and resurrection. How else can we make sense of anything going on in the world, our communities, our families, and our personal lives? There is an essential need to be firmly rooted in our faith, and the only way to do that is to be present with our church family - our sisters and brothers in Christ - for worship, study, devotion, service and fellowship.

So let's join together! Let's journey to the cross as a family of faith, so that we might know the abundant life that comes only in and through our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

#### KIDS HOPE USA

I recently listened to a webinar presented by David Staal, president of KIDS HOPE USA. He stated that KIDS HOPE USA has been in existence for almost 24 years and has touched the lives of about 90,000 children. That is an amazing number!

They have found that students usually ask the following five (5) questions. Beginning with Number 5, the questions, Staal's comments, and additional comments about our program are listed below.

#### Question #5 – Are you paid?

This might be camouflaged as "Where do you work?" What the student really wants to know is whether or not the mentor is there because he is being paid to do a job or whether s/he is there because s/he WANTS to be there. The child really wants to know the mentor's motive. He wants to know whether or not s/he is valued. Just last week, I heard one of our mentees ask his mentor this very question. Of course, the mentor told the child that he did not get paid to come to school. He assured the child that he was there because he wanted to see him and enjoyed working with him. Naturally, this produced a huge smile on the child's face.

#### Question #4 - Who else do you meet with?

A student may also ask, "How many times do you come to school each week?" What s/he really wants to know is "Am I special?" When the mentor assures the child that he is there for only him/her, the child feels valued and special. This must be music to the heart of the child! Almost every child in our program has asked this question. Each of them has then been told that s/he is the only child the mentor comes to visit each week.

#### Question#3 - What are we going to do today?

Many of the mentored students come from homes where there are few boundaries. Many have little structure in their lives. The KIDS HOPE USA mentoring hour is designed to change the trajectory of the students' lives. Because of their training, mentors have been equipped with tools they can use to customize the hour for the students. If the child struggles with reading, the mentor can focus on that subject. If the child needs some character development, the mentor has time to focus on the traits the child needs to develop. If the child needs help with life skills, the mentor can focus on them. Life skills are rarely taught in the homes of many of our mentees. Opportunities to learn basic social skills, build confidence, or learn coping skills may only be taught by the mentor during the mentoring hour.

#### Question # 2 - Can you find a mentor for my friend?

Directors usually hear this question, and it is quite a compliment. It means that the child loves coming to the mentoring hour and wants the same great experience for his friends. Currently, there is a huge demand for more KIDS HOPE USA mentoring programs. Fourteen thousand (14,000) programs exist today, and 3,000 schools are waiting for programs. We have had several students who have asked to have their friends come to the mentoring hour with them. Students who do not have mentors have asked the director if they can have one too. Recently, the ELL teacher at Whitney shared that she was doing a test with one of her students. She asked him, "What is your favorite day of the week? Why?" The student replied, "My favorite day of the week is Tuesday because I get to see my KIDS HOPE mentor."

#### Now for the most asked question – Question #1 – Will you come back?

Every student asks this question - either aloud or in his heart. Many of our students have experienced upsetting relationships or relationships that end and go away. They want to know if this relationship with a KIDS HOPE USA mentor will be different.

Herein lies the foundation of HOPE. As the mentors faithfully return week after week, the students realize that their lives have changed and that there is hope that the rest of their lives can change too.

Staal shared the story of a foster child. The principal of the school he attended liked to introduce the mentor and child to each other. When the mentor arrived at her office, she called for the student. He showed up with his coat on and all of his belongings packed up in his book bag. When the principal asked him why he had all of his belongings, he replied, "Didn't you call me because I have to go to another foster home?"

The principal told him, "No. you are not leaving. I wanted to introduce you to your KIDS HOPE mentor." The child said, "Wait! You mean I get to stay here?"

Love came to this child just as it comes to the students we mentor in Strongsville. We love because God first loved us. Love changes everything, and it certainly brings hope.


